## **Evaluating Information – Applying the CRAAP Test**

When you search for information, you're going to find lots of it . . . but is it good information? You will have to determine that for yourself, and the **CRAAP Test** can help. The **CRAAP Test** is a list of questions to help you evaluate the information you find. Different criteria will be more or less important depending on your situation or need.

	Does it answer	Rationale
<u>Currency</u> : The timeliness of the information.	<ol> <li>When was the information published or posted?</li> <li>Has the information been revised or updated?</li> <li>Does your topic require current information, or will older sources work as well?</li> </ol>	
Relevance: The importance of the information for your needs.	<ol> <li>Does the information relate to your topic or answer your question?</li> <li>Who is the intended audience?</li> <li>Is the information at an appropriate level (i.e. not too elementary or advanced for your needs)?</li> <li>Have you looked at a variety of sources before determining this is one you will use?</li> <li>Would you be comfortable citing this source in your research paper?</li> </ol>	
<u>Authority</u> : The source of the information.	<ol> <li>Who is the author/publisher/source/sponsor?</li> <li>What are the author's credentials or organizational affiliations?</li> <li>Is the author qualified to write on the topic?</li> </ol>
